Dear friends

‘Oh Christmas Tree, how lovely are your branches...’

The Christmas tree, which later this month will become a beautiful feature of our church and many of our homes has a long and interesting history. Tradition credits St. Boniface with the invention of the Christmas tree. Boniface was born in Devon in the 7th century, and became a missionary and eventually a bishop in Germany. His missionary endeavours did not go without troubles: one story tells that the great ‘Oak of Thor’ at Geismar, which was an object of heathen worship, was chopped down by Boniface in a stage-managed confrontation with the old gods and local heathen tribes. A fir tree growing in the roots of the Oak was claimed by Boniface as a new symbol for Christians. "This humble tree's wood is used to build your homes: let Christ be at the centre of your households. Its leaves remain evergreen in the darkest days: let Christ be your constant light. Its boughs reach out to embrace and its top points to heaven: let Christ be your Comfort and Guide", he encouraged them.

Modern use of Christmas trees date from the sixteenth century, when a Christmas Tree is recorded to have been erected in Strasbourg Cathedral in 1539; the custom gradually spread across Germany. In Britain, the Christmas tree was introduced in the time of George III and Queen Charlotte, who came from Germany, and initially the custom did not spread much beyond the royal family. Now, of course, Christmas trees are everywhere – in many different shapes and sizes, real and artificial; and they come with many local traditions and folk tales. One that I particularly like is this:

“The Three Christmas Trees” is a Scandinavian folktale. It is the story of three young pine trees growing together on a hilltop. Each one of them had a different dream for their lives. The first wanted to be made into a beautiful treasure box, to hold the most valuable jewels in the world. The second wanted to become a wonderful ship, and carry the most important people on the oceans of the world. The third tree had a more simple and (he thought) humble dream: to stay right there on the hillside and grow tall and strong, pointing everyone towards God in heaven. When the big day for felling these trees came, they all were disappointed — the first was made into an animal’s feeding trough, the second into a small fishing boat, and the third was left just as logs in a lumber-yard. What had happened to their dreams? But, with time, all three came to see how they were caught up into the story of God in very special ways not of their own making. The first tree became the feeding trough that held the newly born Son of God, the second tree became the fishing boat from which the man of God stilled the storm, and the third — he became the cross on which Jesus the Messiah was crucified, pointing the way to God for all generations.

So enjoy your Christmas Tree, and may it be for you, along with many other traditions that we keep at this time of year, another pointer to the true meaning of Christmas, the birth of Jesus Christ our Lord.

Developments in RE at Holy Trinity School

The room was also open to parents and children for this term’s Narnia- themed Messy Church. The Godly Play Room became a place where families could create their perfect world out of Lego.

Our RE week celebrated the work of C.S. Lewis and coincided with the 50th anniversary of his death. Children were able to reflect deeply on the meaning of Aslan’s sacrifice and draw parallels with the death and resurrection of Christ. PCC Meeting 26 September 2013

The PCC met on Thursday 26th September 2013, the main areas of discussion were as follows:

- Richard reported on another successful Holiday Club and recorded his thanks to all those who had worked so hard to make it a success.
- There was a Farewell Party after the Holiday Club for Kevin Draper and his family, and he was presented with a cheque for £1325 reflecting the generous donations from parishioners.
- During September Ann Clarridge had organised a quiet day at Chipperfield, led by Rev Lynn Phillips, who also preached at the 10am service on 7 September. There had also been the Pet Service and a Prayer Vigil for those suffering in Syria and Egypt.
- Following Kevin's departure, Richard has met with the leaders of Junior Church and reported that Deborah Layde has taken on the responsibility for organising leaders rotas and that the programme of activities on a Sunday will continue as before. The Saturday Morning

football is being led by Patrick O'Neill and Andrew Newell but the Friday Fries group will not operate until a new Youth Minister is appointed. There will again be two LST students on placement with us during term time.

- Looking forward, Holy Trinity was again entering a team in the Moor Park 10k run which was an important community event with sponsorship money going to a good local cause. Bishop Mauricio was also visiting at the end of September which provided us with the opportunity to celebrate his ten years as Bishop of Brasilia.
- Our Harvest celebrations on 6 October would provide support for the Watford New Hope Trust who would receive the produce offerings, and Us who would receive financial donations for their Harvest 2013 appeal.
- Richard was pleased to report that Bishop Pete has agreed that the parish should have a trainee curate, and Peter Godden will join us in June 2014 for 3 years. Richard confirmed that Ann Clarridge will be moving from Lees Avenue next year, but will continue to be part of the Ministry Team. Finally, it is also intended that a gap year student will come as a Youth Work Assistant for 2014 /15 and this student will be supervised by the new Youth Minister.
- Andrew Newell introduced a Heating Report that had been produced by a Heating Engineer on the Church Heating System. The report set out a number of options to improve the heating in Church with some ballpark estimates of likely costs. The PCC approved the establishment of a Working Group to meet with the Heating Engineer to work through the options and to make a final recommendation on which option to pursue at the November 2013 PCC Meeting. The aim would be to undertake improvements during the summer of 2014.
- Sally Rogers reported that the Vicarage was showing signs of wear and tear and that it was necessary to undertake a programme of refurbishment, including redecoration and new carpets. This was approved by the PCC.
- Graham Hamwijk reported on the state of finances as at 31 August, these showed a deficit to Budget of circa £8k on the general funds. It was agreed that the Finance Committee would discuss the accounts in more detail at their forthcoming meeting. Brian Watkins also undertook to provide the PCC with an update on the Future Projects Fund.
- Sally Rogers reported that the Parish Hall Improvements had been achieved over the summer in very tight timescales, there was a need for the floor to have a further coat of varnish at Half Term. All agreed

that the Hall has been greatly enhanced by the refurbishment. New Chairs are now required for the foyer area and it was proposed that we seek donations for these at £75 per chair, with up to 6 required.

- Richard thanked Sally Rogers and Nigel Washbourn for all their hard work in bringing this project to fruition.
- Richard reported that a job description and advert has been prepared for the Children, Youth and Family Minister role adverts were being placed during October with the aim of interviewing towards the end of November. The interview panel would comprise, Richard, the two Churchwardens and the Head Teacher of Holy Trinity School. Given the likely timescales for recruitment, it was intended to let the property in Tanworth Close on a short 6 month tenancy.
- Ann Clarridge reported that the Mission and Outreach Committee had met to consider Capital Vision 2020 implications for our Mission Action Plan; two further meetings are planned and a fuller update will be provided to the November PCC Meeting.
- Andrew Newell reported that the Church Guttering and downpipes were in urgent need of repair and repainting and the PCC approved a budget of £13,313 which would be met from the Designated Maintenance Fund. The Patio outside the Parish Rooms has been completed, and the cost has been met by the grant of £1k received last year and donations for the remaining costs, and garden furniture has also been donated.
- Brian Watkins proposed a budget of £1500 to redecorate Tanworth Close which was agreed.
- Andrew Newell recorded thanks to Richard Read for repainting the white lines in the car park, and to John Chapman, for leading the removal of the tree stump from the Churchyard.
- Andrew Newell reported that the defect in the lighting in the South Aisle has now been rectified, and a toilet has been replaced in the Parish Rooms. John Barraclough reported that the flat roof over the Parish Hall Kitchen is leaking, and he was authorised to seek an urgent repair at best price.
- The PCC agreed a budget of £306 to purchase a Who's Who Board for the Trinity Corner.
- Distribution of the Harvest edition of "Good News" had gone better than the previous distribution, although logistical challenges remained. The PCC agreed to persevere with the current in-house approach for the next edition.
- Carole Hamwijk reported on the arrangements for the Macmillan Coffee Morning on 27 September, and the Harvest Hog Roast on 6

October. It was also noted that the Autumn Bazaar would be held on 28 October.

- Carole Hamwijk presented the School report prepared by Mair Henton, this covered the extensive building improvements that had been made over the summer and in particular the provision of a Godly Play room at the School. The School are inviting the Church Community to come into School for coffee after the morning service on 17 November in order to see these new facilities. The School are holding their Christmas Bazaar on 30 November. The School Choir is also regularly attending the monthly Parish Tea, and on 17 December the Parish Tea will be hosted in the School.
- The PCC noted that a bequest has been received from the estate of Dr Joan Shaw, and the PCC agreed that this should be allocated to the Future Projects Fund.
- Future Meetings – The next PCC Meeting is scheduled for the 20 November 2013.

6. 'To Autumn' by John Keats (1795-1821)
7. Equinox : when night and day are of equal length when the sun crosses the celestial equator. Solstice : When the sun reaches its extreme southern position (winter solstice), its lowest position in the sky resulting in the shortest day (Sol+sistere = sun stands still).
